#### *Sunshine Coast Airport Expansion*

The Sunshine Coast Airport Expansion Project is another step closer towards delivery, with the Minister for State Development Anthony Lynham releasing the State Coordinator General's report accepting the Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for the project.

Mayor Mark Jamieson welcomed the news, saying the Coordinator General's report and approval was an important step towards the region's game-changer project becoming a reality.

The Airport Expansion Project includes delivering a new 2450m x 45m runway fully compliant with regulatory standards; runway end taxiway loops, an expanded apron and terminal facilities, a new air traffic control tower and associated infrastructure.

"The Project will deliver a world of opportunities and is a major game-changer for the Sunshine Coast and surrounding regions," Mayor Jamieson said.

"It will enable direct flights to more destinations across Australia, Asia and the Western Pacific, enhancing national and global connections.

"It will also generate jobs and economic growth, boost tourism, help export businesses and secure air access to the Sunshine Coast for generations to come.

"The Commonwealth Government will now review the Coordinator General's report and council looks forward to receiving approvals, due within 30 days of the report being received. Further specific project approvals will also be required before works can commence.

"I congratulate council's project team on the quality of the Environmental Impact Statement and the work they have done on this project to date.

"Today is another chapter of this exciting project which has a long history, having been on the drawing board since the 1980s and I look forward to the day the first plane takes off on our new runway."

Mayor Jamieson said the council would now consider the conditions and recommendations contained within the Coordinator General's report and envisaged the new runway would be open for operations in 2020.

Sunshine Coast Council Aviation Portfolio Councilor Steve Robinson said the \$347 million Sunshine Coast Airport Expansion Project would help grow passenger numbers and support the needs of the growing Sunshine Coast community.

"It is anticipated it will contribute \$4.1 billion to the local economy and result in 3500 fewer dwellings being affected by noise each day," Cr Robinson said.

The announcement comes on the back of news that Sunshine Coast Airport is the fastest growing airport in the country for the eighth consecutive month.

Recently released data from the Commonwealth Bureau of Infrastructure, Transport and Regional Economics (BITRE) confirms a 24% year on year increase in total passengers for the month of February.

Growth can be attributed to strong ongoing demand for services at Sunshine Coast Airport from both local residents and visitors, as well as the introduction of Qantas services to Sydney in December last year. The introduction of flights from Adelaide to the Sunshine Coast three times a week starting this September, will also add 56,000 seats each year to the airport's capacity.

#### *Nojoor Road Boat Ramp & Car Update*

You may remember an article in the May newsletter about the upgrade to the Nojoor Road boat ramp. The upgrade was due to be completed by October this year. You will be pleased to hear that in the words of councilor Jason O'Pray that the initial completion date has been "blown out of the water". The project is currently on track for completion by the end of July

The TWRA is considering options to minimise parking disputes and while imposing a 12-hour parking limit across Twin Waters was considered it was deemed unworkable across the whole community.

Another solution must be found to this problem and it will probably involve a change in the parking regulations, so it is unlikely to happen in the short term, but it is something that the committee will continue to work on.

## Ever Thought of Starting a Reading Group?

Have you often thought about starting your own book club? It can be a great way to open up discussions, read books outside your usual genre and share some of your favourite authors. From small groups that gather in living rooms and libraries to the millions who tune in to find out Oprah's picks each month, reading groups are as popular as ever. If you are not sure how to get started, here are some tips.

The easiest way to start a reading group is to phone a friend! Call or e-mail one or two friends who share your love of books and suggest you read one together. Pick a book you think you'll all enjoy and set up a date to discuss it. If each of you brings a friend to the next meeting, soon you'll have a regular group going!

You can also contact your library as they often have reading sets available to loan. This also, avoids the cost of purchasing every book you read..

The ideal group size is between 8 and 12 members. While commitment is important, not everyone will be able to make it to every meeting. Fewer than 8, and some days you might not have enough for a good discussion. More than 12, and you risk not allowing everyone to be heard.

Once you've gotten your group going, you'll want to discuss how you'll be organized, and consider how you'll make your book selections. Some groups specialize in certain types of reading: nonfiction, mysteries, foreign authors. It's a good idea to appoint a secretary who keeps track of your book lists (both what you've read and what you plan to read), sends out reminders about your meetings and contacts a local bookstore/library about getting enough copies of the book for your group and you can take it in turns to play host.

You can also swap and share your treasures of favourite books at each meeting as well, just pop your name in the front cover or get your secretary to keep track of who has what. This is a fabulous way to access to a great supply of books that come highly recommended.

People join reading groups for many reasons: the reading of good books and the discussions they inspire, exposure to new ideas and differing viewpoints, and an opportunity to socialize with other book lovers. Whatever your reasons for starting one or joining one, as long as you remember to keep it fun and keep the focus on books, you're sure to find your reading group a rewarding experience!
