As usual, TWRA is happy to provide a bar-b-que breakfast and lucky dip prizes to kick things along.



Council Elections Loom Again – Saturday, 16 March And a changing of the Guard: as our long-term Councillor, Jason OPray stands for Mayor!



Jason has been our Councillor for three terms, since 2012. During this time, he has been a strong supporter of TWRA and our community. He has assisted us in many ways over the years including responding to ratepayer concerns on many matters, access to and support for Council grants, attending our events (including being co-compere with Fiona Simpson for our Christmas Carols.) We thank Jason for his support and contribution to our community and we wish him well in the future.

So far, three candidates have announced their intention to stand in Division 8 on 16 March. Candidate nominations close on Tuesday, 13 February, so more candidates may throw their hat into the ring before the closing date.

The three candidates who have nominated so far are:

Twin Waters West Development Update following Council approval

At its meeting on 14 December, Sunshine Coast Council formally approved the Twin Waters West Development Application from major developer, Stockland by a vote of 6 to 4.

It is the company's third attempt to develop the area formally known as 'The Canelands' running parallel with the Sunshine Coast Motorway. As the next step, we are now in a 30-business day period for any appeals, which will expire around 6th February. If there are no appeals, Stockland can proceed with their proposed development.

An appeal would require another Qld Planning & Environment Court hearing which, based on previous experience, would take many months to be finalised, maybe during 2024 or possibly into 2025.

Stockland's third DA is vastly different from their first DA, lodged back in 2007. Now, only 450 residential housing lots are proposed compared with 1200-1400 residential units (houses and apartments) originally proposed. There are many other significant design and environmental improvements also included in this DA.

TWRA has been a significant force in the evolution of this proposal, encouraging innovations such as the addition of a lake – mirroring the original Twin Waters development.

The Twin Waters West area is included within the future urban footprint of the State's SEQ Regional Development plan to cater for forecast population growth on the Coast.

Maintenance Report from Tony Freeman of the TWRA Maintenance Committee:

Rain and wind keeps the contractors working

We have had more than our regular dose of rain. The Contractors have been on site throughout the holiday season and were barely being able to keep up with the speed of fast-growing grass! They continue to keep to schedule to maintain all the public areas.

The Street Sweeping truck has recently been in Twin Waters doing the six-monthly clearing of streets and gutters. At least this time we didn't have strong winds following the truck which we had in December 2022! TWRA received a few queries about the street sweepers but we need better advice from Council regarding the timing so we can advise residents to ensure the curb areas are clear of cars, rubbish bins, vans etc! If the area is not clear, then the sweeper vehicle just keeps going. The storms over the Christmas-New Year time, meant a few large branches and trees were blown down; the Contractors removed the smaller branches and Council Arborists and tree crews removed the others guite guickly!

Raining Cats and Dogs: The Figures




Every day, Twin Waters resident, Mark Garner records the rainfall when it happens – and of late he's been very busy. 2024 is off to a very wet start, with nearly 470 mm in the gauge to the end of January. Ironically, 2023 was a relatively dry one for us in Twin Waters, with only 966 mm of rain for the full year. This was well below the rainfall in 2022 (2,502 mm) and also well below the long-term average for our area of the Coast (1,483 mm). We had rain on only 107 days last year – the long-term average of rain days is 165.

2023's wettest month was December, due to the rain over the Christmas period leading to our soggy January.

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












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
